Helping Struggling Readers: Successful Reading Techniques ...

Reading fluency is most commonly assessed by listening to children read aloud. When readers lack fluency, their oral reading sounds choppy or hesitant, lacking the accuracy, rhythm, and flow that indicates confident understanding of the text. When reading aloud, the student should focus on accuracy rather than speed.

Five Ways to Help Struggling Readers Build Reading Fluency

Showing that you care, showing that you are on your child’s side, and showing that you sincerely want your child to succeed, will help to turn a reluctant and struggling reader into a successful reader. Remember that it’s all in the delivery. Be as cheerful and supportive as possible. Watch the tone in your voice.

Effective Interventions for Struggling Readers

Structured literacy instruction (Orton-Gillingham approach) is the most effective intervention. Research has shown that systematic, explicit, sequential and multi-sensory instruction (structured literacy instruction) provided by a trained professional is the most effective approach for teaching struggling readers how to read.

Analyze the Assessment An important first step in helping struggling readers is figuring out what they already know to determine what to teach next. This simple reading assessment is a great place to start or you can use the test required by your district. Look for patterns and clues in the data.

• One of the keys to help struggling readers is to get them reading more. As with most activities—for example, playing an instrument—the more you practice, the better player you become. The more students read the better readers they grow to be. Studies show students read more when they read culturally relevant books.

Simple Strategies to Help Struggling Readers Achieve Grade ...

Teach your child how to break down segments of words. Allow them to use a pointer or ruler to slide over the words as they read. Through time and practice, they’ll start "chunking" the words together as a habit and the reading will start to come!Continue to read aloud to your child as often as you can.

How to Teach Reading Skills to Struggling Readers: Tips ...

Teach blending (reading) and segmenting (spelling): Struggling emergent readers need 25 to 50 exposures before they master concepts, and they need lots of opportunities to make connections. Research shows that phoneme blending and segmenting support increased word learning in students.

But often, struggling readers just need a little extra tutoring and plenty of support, Meyer says. Outside of home, some schools offer free tutoring on site, often during the day.
